

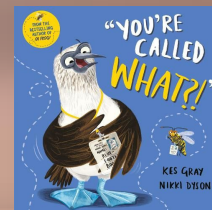
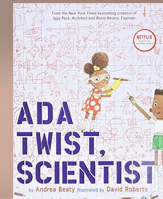
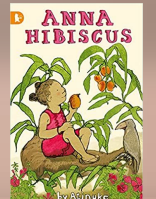
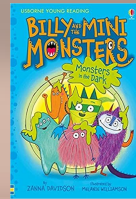
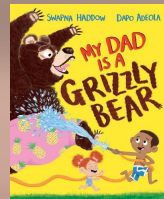
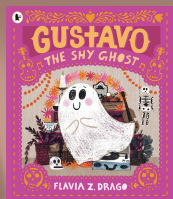
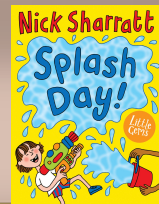
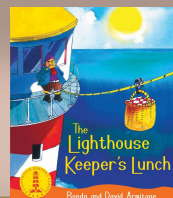
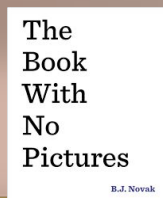
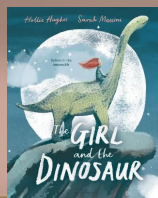
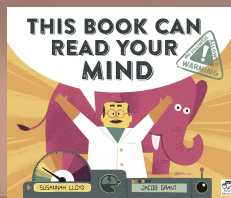
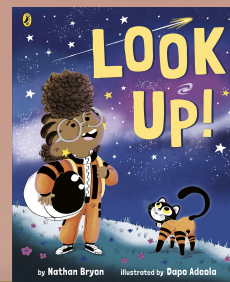
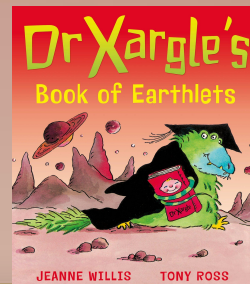
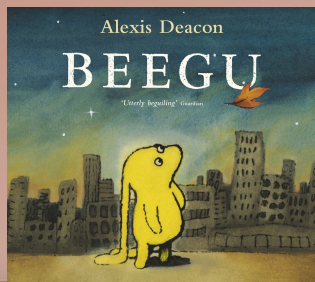
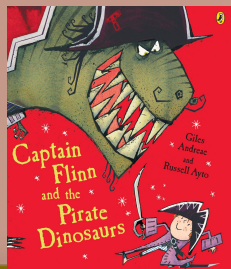
How to use our Reading for Pleasure Book Collections

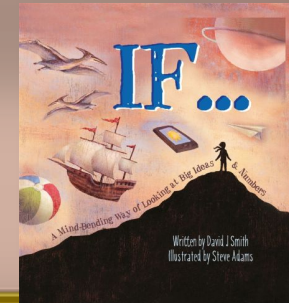
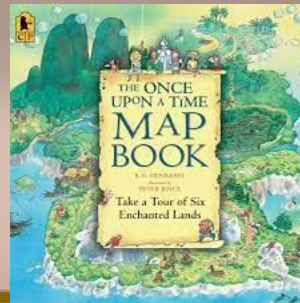
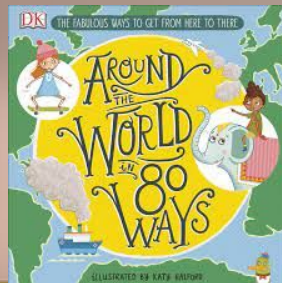
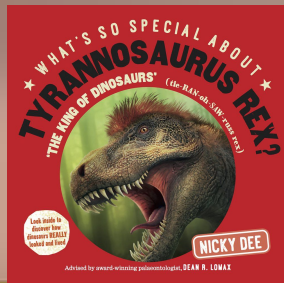
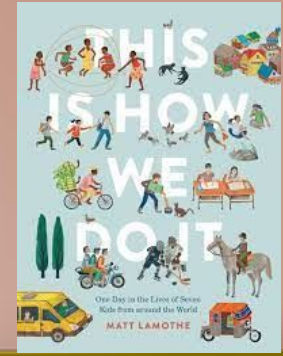
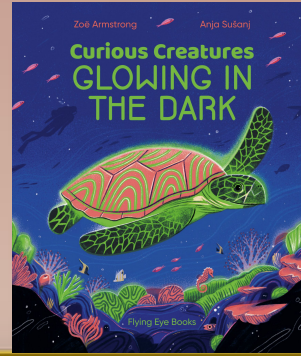
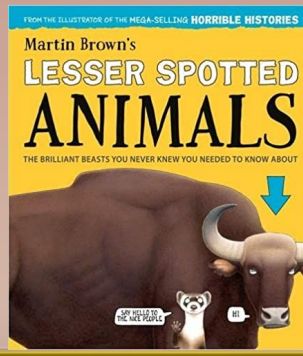
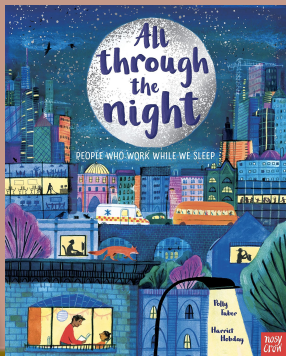
There is no right or wrong way to read for pleasure at home. These are suggested books that you may enjoy sharing with your child to develop their love of books. There are many different ways of sharing books together, you can:

Read aloud to your child	Listen to your child read	Take turns reading sections of the book
Let your child read independently	Simply enjoy looking at the illustrations	Perform the book to siblings, family members and friends
Talk about the book, characters and make predictions	Re-read old favourites again and again	Read a book that you wouldn't normally pick up

You may want to use books from a different year group's collection - books from a younger year group can improve reading confidence and independence whilst books from an older year group can be shared together to help challenge your child. When developing a love of reading, the most important thing is to find books that your child loves - whether they are wordless books, easy books, fiction or non-fiction or something else entirely!

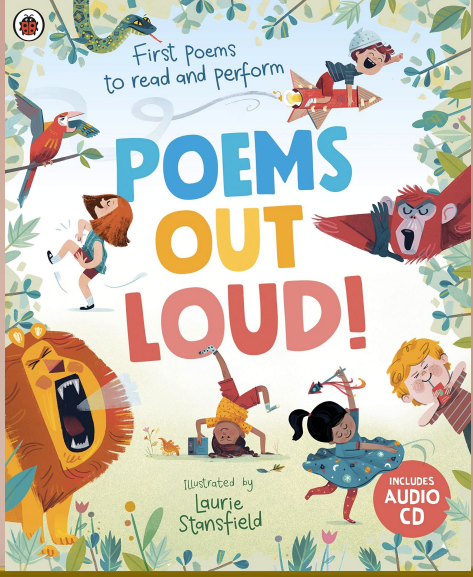
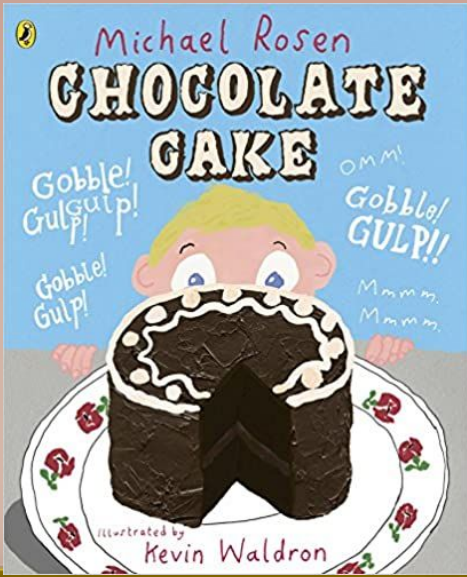
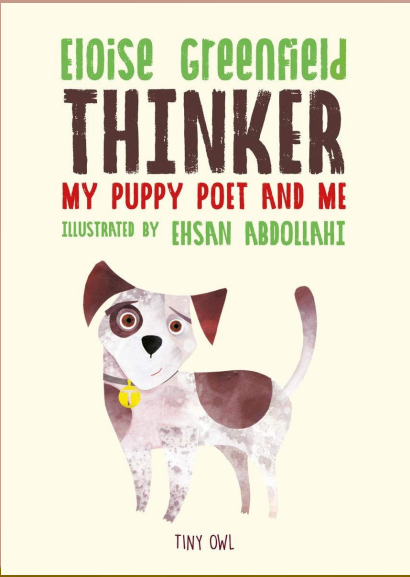

The Girl and the Dinosaur by Hollie Hughes

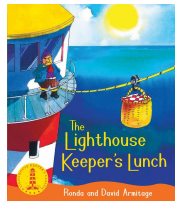

Gustavo the Shy Ghost by Flavia Z. Drago

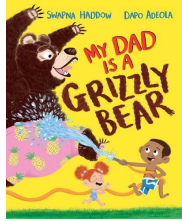

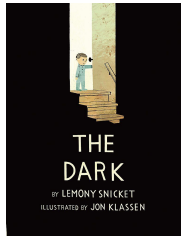
My Dad is a Grizzly Bear by Swapna Haddow

The Fox and the Star by Coralie Bickford-Smith

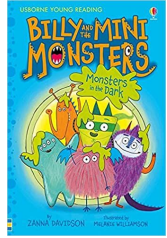

The Dark by Lemony Snickett

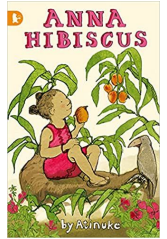

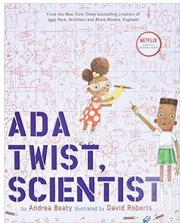
Billy and the Mini-Monsters: Monsters in the Dark by Zanna Davidson

Anna Hibiscus by Atinuke

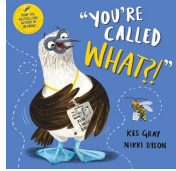

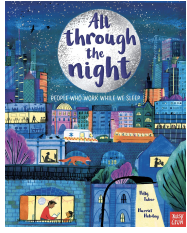

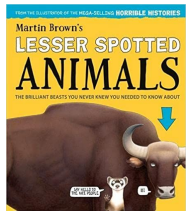
All Through the Night by Polly Faber

She Heard the Birds by Andrea D'Aquino

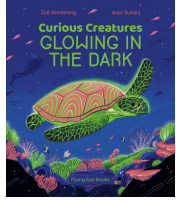

Lesser Spotted Animals by Martin Brown

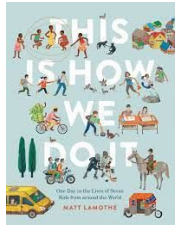

The Once Upon a Time Map Book by B G Hennessy

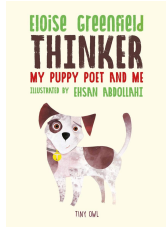

If: A Mind-bending Way of Looking at Big Numbers by David J Smith

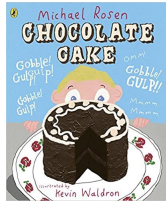
