Start of the school day:

- Please make two lines behind the second gate opposite the classroom, in front the signs
- The door opens at 8:40am
- Give your child their belongings
- Say your goodbyes
- Your child will put their bag away and begin their morning work
- The door will close at 8.50am



Staggered start:

- Your child will attend three half day sessions, with lunch
- Time to get to know each other
- Quieter sessions
- Time to explore the environment





Our daily routine:

Lunch:

- Children eat with their friends in the dining room, with Reception adults
- School lunch pre-ordered and paid for on Schoolgrid
- Packed lunches should be healthy and balanced
- We are a nut free school
- After their lunch, the children spend time outside



Rolling snack:

- Children are offered a healthy snack in school, which is available throughout the morning and afternoon
- They build up food preparation skills by cutting and spreading as well as lots of talk around healthy eating
- We provide seasonal activities such as, making pancakes

Please regularly update us with changes to your child's allergies.



Tapestry:



- An online learning journal system
- Staff record children's progress and activities using iPads
- Photos, videos and observations are uploaded onto an online app regularly
- Share your child's home learning and achievements



Maximising your child's potential:



- Being on time for school every day
- Attending every session, avoiding term time holiday
- Establishing good routines at home
- Showing a positive interest in your child's learning
- Encouraging your child to take risks and experience failure so they develop perseverance and resilience
- Encouraging your child to develop their independence and be there to praise their efforts
- Engaging in school life with your child



Independence:

- Be independent in putting on coats and shoes
- Wash and dry hands by themselves
- Increasingly able to use the toilet independently
- Organise their own belongings

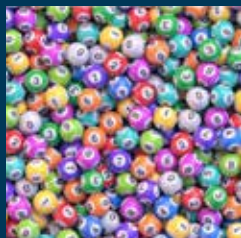
